

At the February 22nd St. John's Council meeting, Bowring Park Foundation chair, Mike Power, and the past-chair, John Downton, presented the City with a cheque for \$835,531 for the Foundation's share of the Midstream Project in Bowring Park.

In his remarks, Mr. Downton recounted the origins of the Bowring Park Foundation and this particular project. "The Foundation was formed in 1995 by a group of volunteer citizens to assist the City of St. John's with the restoration and development of Bowring Park. The Midstream Project was identified by the Foundation as a priority from the commissioned 2005 Master Plan for the park." Mr. Downton thanked the City for cost-sharing this project, which included the reconstruction of the Fountain Pond and the construction of a barrier free playground and splash pad. "It is our hope that this park will be enjoyed by many future generations." Downton said.

The chair, Mr. Power, acknowledged Husky Energy's contribution of \$300,000 towards the reconstruction of the Fountain Pond. "Husky's support for this effort demonstrates their commitment to our community." said Power. He also thanked two special organizations, United Way of Newfoundland and Labrador and the VOCM Cares Foundation for their financial donations of \$25,000 and \$50,000 respectively towards the Barrier Free Playground. Power said, "This inclusive playground should benefit all children who visit the park for many years to come."

Mr. Power expressed thanks to the Grand Concourse Authority for their leadership as the project manager and to the Point Contracting Company for their excellent work. "The completed project is one in which we all can take pride." Power thanked the City for its support to the Foundation. "We look forward to partnering with the City on our next project in Bowring Park, the restoration of the Stone Bridge." Power concluded.

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
IN MEMORIAM DERRICK BOWRING

Bowring Park Foundation's Honorary Patron, Mr. Derrick Bowring passed away at the age of 93 on December 10, 2009. Mr. Bowring was the great-great-grandson of Benjamin Bowring, who came to Newfoundland from England in 1811 and started the Bowring business. To celebrate their 100th anniversary in business in 191, the Bowring Brothers Ltd. donated 50 acres of land to the City of St. John's. This land became Bowring Park.

Foundation chairman, Michael Power, said that Bowring's legacy will live on in the park well into the future. "Mr. Bowring arranged to have a large donation made to the park about 10 years ago. We've built upon that donation and have completed a master plan for the park." Power said. Bowring was a great source when looking for information about the park, Power added. "The park has been there

almost 100 years and Mr. Bowring lived through most of it. So when we were looking for guidance, we'd go to him." Power said.

Foundation past chairman, John Downton, remembers Mr. Bowring as a very private man, very modest, very caring. "He had a great social conscience. He gave a lot back. But



he did it in a very unassuming way. He absolutely wanted no recognition for what he did." Downton said.

A memorial service was held in St. John's for Mr. Bowring on December 17. A funeral service will be held in Burnside, Bonavista Bay, on Sunday, August 15, 2010.

BOWRING PARK FOUNDATION'S NEXT PROJECT

RESTORATION OF STONE BRIDGE

The Bowring Park Foundation is partnering with the City of St. John's to restore the Stone Bridge that crosses over South Brook near the tennis courts. This bridge was constructed in 1931 by Bowring Park personnel under then Superintendent Alfred Canning. The bridge is built in the form of an arch with bent railway tracks inside to give it its shape. The stones forming the bridge's exterior were collected along the railway line adding to its historical significance. Many park visitors have admired the Stone Bridge over the years but it now requires some work to restore it to its original form.





FEATURES & ATTRACTIONS OF BOWRING PARK

The bell was originally placed in Bowring Park as a means to inform park patrons that the park closed at 10:00 p.m. The park superintendent, who lived in the Lodge, would ring the bell at 9:50 p.m. and then again at 10:00 p.m. to alert visitors that it was time to leave. The area in which the bell is located is known as the Rosaria, meaning the Rose Garden. It is across from the Swan Winter Quarters (on the same side as the Conservatory). The exact origin of the bell is unknown but it is believed that it was either a gift from Bowring Brothers from one of their ships or from the Reid Railway Car. Today, staff no longer ring the bell to signify the park's closing. However, visitors enjoy ringing it to make their presence known to other park patrons.



One of Bowring Park's most popular trees is the extraordinary Weeping Beech located near the Bungalow. Planted in 1916, it stands out because it is a grafted tree. The root system for the Weeping Beech could not survive the Newfoundland climate so the top part of the tree was grafted onto the trunk and root system of a Green Beech. There is a prominent bump on the trunk where the graft was made. It has undergone some repairs and doctoring which will ensure that this special tree is around for a long time to come.



The Bowring Park Foundation was established in 1995 as a not-for-profit organization under the patronage of Mr. Derrick Bowring. Its mandate is to assist the City of St. John's with the restoration, preservation and development of Bowring Park.
